As part of the executive branch, federal agencies play a role in enforcing laws and policies to achieve these ends. ## THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE DEPARTMENT

Each of the roughly 12,000 career federal employees at the Department of State is committed to the mission of the organization: To protect and promote U.S. security, prosperity, and democratic values and shape an international environment in which all Americans can thrive. Veterans make up about 20% of the department.<sup>1</sup>

### TYPE OF WORK

State Department staff work within subcomponents, that is, entities within the department. These include:



Regional bureaus such as the Bureau of Western Hemisphere Affairs and the Bureau of African Affairs, which develop and implement U.S. policies and diplomatic responses



Programmatic bureaus such as the Bureau of Conflict and Stabilization Operations and the Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs, which lead cross-cutting initiatives to advance the State Department mission across all regions




U.S. embassies in 173 countries, which serve as the official headquarters for U.S. diplomats and government representatives and assist American citizens who travel to or live in these countries

### WHERE THEY WORK

Employees at State work throughout the United States and around the globe. Most career staff work inside the Washington, D.C., area, which helps centralize global coordination.<sup>2</sup>

### THE STATE DEPARTMENT IN YOUR BACKYARD

The State Department is responsible for connecting U.S. citizens with the world by issuing U.S. passports. In 2024, the department issued about 24.5 million passport books and cards. That year, the department also launched a new online passport renewal service to ensure Americans can more easily access passport services.

Based on Partnership for Public Service research, 77% of the people who used passport services between January 2020 and 2024 were satisfied with their experience.

### 2023 Emerging Leaders Medal

State employees Fletcher Schoen and Jennifer Harkins won the 2023 Service to America Emerging Leader medal for their outstanding work. They played integral roles in the release of 11 American prisoners wrongfully detained in Russia and Venezuela, contributing to creative diplomatic strategies and delicate negotiations while showing compassion to the families and keeping them informed.
